
Statement of Rights

The Statement of Rights ensures older people can:

- make their own decisions about their own life
- have their decisions not just accepted, but respected
- get information and support to help make their own decisions
- communicate their wishes needs and preferences
- feel safe and respected
- have their culture and identity respected.

Rights are legislated not symbolic; they must be embedded and upheld

Quality Aged Care Services

Care and services that:

- keep older people safe from preventable harm
- are person-centred, provided with kindness and compassion, responding to the holistic needs of the older person and aiming to improve their wellbeing
- are inclusive, culturally safe, trauma aware and healing informed
- are effective, providing the right care to meet the older person's needs goals and preferences
- are smoothly coordinated when care is provided by the workforce, health professionals and external providers





System improvement

Definitions:


'a set of things working together as parts of a mechanism or a network; a complex whole' 'a way of working, organizing, or doing something which follows a fixed plan or set of rules' To be effective the system needs to be:

- Documented
- Integrated
- Communicated
- Evaluated
- Designated



Culture

- Determines the way things are done
- Key finding of the Royal Commission that change needed
- Requires an authentic, deeply embedded commitment to quality & safety
- Oakden review missed the point of the Standards, had a culture of meeting targets not care quality
